ANNUAL MEETING SPEAKER

The speaker for our Annual Meeting on March 19 will be Joseph O'Connor. Mr. O'Connor's degree is from The State University of New York in Ecology and Physiology. In graduate school he had a job as caretaker and trail walker on a 5,000 acre preserve. He was with the Department of Environmental Health Sciences at New York University focusing on the study of Marine Life in Chesapeake Bay, the Hudson River and Atlantic Ocean.

Joe is retired now and lives in Alameda. He will be talking about his walks, always with a camera, along a three-quarter-mile stretch of Alameda Shoreline which has been restored after being the anchorage for Alaska Clippers, a fish cannery, and Bethlehem Ship Yard during World War I and II. The shoreline has been bulldozed and rebuilt and is now a Research Park and site of luxury condos. But it teems with algae, plants, fungi, clams, worms and crustaceans, fish, birds and mammals. As was famously said by Dr. Ian Malcolm in Jurassic, Life Will Find A Way'. So we will get behind Joe's camera and take a closer look at life in the Alameda Estuary.

Sunday, December 18, 2022 Redwood Regional Park Loop from Skyline Gate Leaders: Sue Lai & Jan Lecklikner

In 2019, Redwood Park was renamed Reinhardt Redwood Regional Park in honor of Dr. Aurelia Henry Reinhardt, President of Mills College, and one of five Park District first Board of Directors in 1934. Redwood trees cover this part of the Oakland hills. Our leader, Sue Lai, took us into

a grove to experience the beauty of the trees. Although second growth, due to the lumbering industry of the 19th century, they provide a lush cover to the many hiking

trails in the park. Twelve hikers joined our leaders at Skyline Gate and descended Stream Trail following the creek

at the bottom of the canyon. We hoped to see Lady Bugs in winter dormancy along this path, but very few were there. From Stream Trail, we ascended Fern Trail and then joined French Trail. As most know, this trail was named for Harold French who founded Contra Costa Hills Club in 1920. climbs and went up to Redwood Peak Trail. More climbing led to Redwood Peak, a rocky outcrop and high point in the park. We then followed West Ridge Trail to our lunch spot at Redwood Bowl. Our return was along West



Ridge Trail with lovely views of forests and hills below. We hiked a little over 8 miles with 1900 ft. of climbing. Thank you, Sue and Jan, for a lovely day in the Redwoods.

While hikers were gathering at Lafayette BART to meet Patricia, others were heading directly to the Lafayette



served deer, egrets, mallards, shovelers, turkey vultures, and even a few humans. The trail took us to Muskrat and D.U.S.T.
