FROM THE CONSERVATION COMMITTEE:

A NEW HILL TO CLIMB

Thanks to a complicated series of agreements, hikers will now be able to climb iconic Bald Hill which looms above Ross and San Anselmo in Marin. Sixty acres have been added to the Bald Hill Open Space for a total of 107 acres. The Marin Open Space Trust (MOST) bought the land including the summit for \$1.85 million dollars. Next, the Marin County Open Space District (MCOSD) paid the trust \$850,000 from money collected from the county's parcel tax. The \$1.25 million balance was raised through the help of many donors including \$250,000 raised by the Tamalpais Conservation Club (TCC). Sweeping views from the top of Bald Hill at 1,132 feet are Mt Tam and large areas of Marin, San Francisco, and San Francisco Bay. Many trails radiate out from the preserve to other parts of the county including the Marin Water District reservoirs, Pt. Reyes National Seashore, and the Golden Gate Bridge. The TCC is one of the organizations to which the CCHC Conservation Committee donates with your generous conservation gifts.

This was one of the warmest days of the year, but to our pleasure, Bill and Yvonne did not cancel this beautiful hike. It was shortened from 8 to 5 1/2 miles in both Sibley Volcanic and Huckleberry Botanic Regional Preserves.



Fourteen hikers joined our leaders at Sibley Volcanic Regional Preserve which is named to honor Robert Sibley, a Park District founder. We started on Overlook Trail to visit the Harold French Memorial Bench

which was dedicated to our founder on September 26, 2019. From there we followed the Skyline Trail, going through Huckleberry Botanic Regional Preserve. It was pleasure to hike through this shaded area with some chal-

lenging hills. Along the way are lovely views of the hills of Contra Costa County. We returned by the Connector to the Upper Huckleberry Loop to lunch at the Huckleberry Staging Area. We took a



short route, following Skyline Blvd. back to Sibley Staging Area. Thank you, Bill and Yvonne, for a delightful



and challenging hike to remember Harold French and to enjoy the native plant communities of our hills, the live oak, manzanita and beautiful ferns.

Thursday, July 20, 2023 Oracle Park – SF Leaders: Sets Amman & Jerry Ford

After 24 of us rounded up at the Ferry Building, we walked 1-1/2 miles to Oracle Park for a tour of the Giants ballpark. Because the tour was sold out, half of the group



took the tour while the rest hiked to Chase Center, then all regrouped for lunch. The tour started with a 10-minute history of the Giants movie. We were told to note how many times we hear the number 24 during the tour. That's the number worn by Willie Mays. The statue of Willie in

front of the stadium is surrounded by 24 palm trees. The post office allowed them to change the address from 100

King Street to 24 Willie Mays Plaza. There are even 24 defibrillators for emergencies. The tour started in the visiting team locker room, then moved to a room beneath the grandstand set up for batting practice. The kitchen is set up to provide custom meals for the players, by the team chef or catered from his favorite restaurant. Next, we gathered on the playing field for a group picture. We learned that the large Coke bottle in the outfield encompasses four slides for kids and is angled at 24 degrees. Coca Cola paid the Giants \$20 million for the naming rights. Our guide talked





about McCovey Cove where kayakers wait for home run balls. No right-handed batter has done it yet. We visited the Tony Bennett luxury suite which rents for \$4,000-\$12,000. In the Giants Museum numerous display cabinets featured famous players and the team's three World Series Trophies. One popular photo-op was the display of life-size figures of pitcher and catcher, all made from Legos. We walked from the ballpark to Delancey Street Restaurant for lunch, then back to BART.

Thousands of marathoners were among the crowds in front of the San Francisco Ferry Building when the twenty-one CCHC hikers met to begin the long, but relatively flat hike. Sunny skies accompanied the group, but



the steady breeze made jackets necessary for the entire hike. The hike started by walking along the Embarcadero,

Jefferson St. then along the Fisherman's Wharf area before stopping at the Maritime Museum for a bathroom break. We continued to hike through Fort Mason, along Marina Blvd. to a long stretch at Crissy Field. A break for lunch at the Warming Hut Park at the end of Crissy Field offered spectacular views of the Golden Gate Bridge, Alcatraz and the San Francisco skyline. After lunch, Teresa sepa-



rated the group into those who wanted to return to BART stations

and the rest who wanted to continue across the bridge another five miles to Sausalito. She led the twelve brave souls who decided to continue on to Sausalito, keeping a brisk pace because time was of the essence to

catch the 3:20 PM ferry back to San Francisco. The walk across the Golden Gate Bridge was a real treat with wonderful views, but quite windy. After crossing, the group took a path under

the bridge to a long downhill road to Sausalito. Along the way, we passed by the Bay Area Discovery Museum at the Ft. Baker site. The final stretch took us along the waterfront in Sausalito, then onto the ferry boat pier with about ten minutes to spare. The total distance was eleven miles with 732 feet of elevation gain. It was a great hike to discover parts of San Francisco and the Bay.

It was a beautiful day with mild temperatures when ten hikers met at the Martin Canyon Creek Trailhead. A new area for many of us. This was a moderate challenging 5mile hike with 1040' elevation. The Martin Canyon Creek

Trail is one of Dublin's littleknown treasures.

After our meet and greet, we started at the trailhead from Silvergate Drive. The paved trail looked like a private path that leads into a gated community but a sign just inside the gate indicated that it was the park trail.

On this beautiful day a group of 12, including one guest, joined our leaders at Eckley Pier, overlooking the Carquinez Strait to begin our hike on a section of the Bull

Valley Trail. We hiked through Eucalyptus Groves and Oak Woodland, always being careful to avoid the prolific poison oak. There were lovely views of the



Strait and the frequent sound of train whistles as this is



the route of freight and passenger trains going to and from the Bay Area. We entered the lovely town of Crockett, making

our way along the streets, past the C&H Sugar Refinery which was established in 1906. Following our lunch at

Alexander Park, Rosemary Johnson led us to the historical markers at the sugar factory. The town of Crockett came from a land grant from Mexico and was named



for Joseph B. Crockett, a judge on the California Supreme Court. The town was established in in 1866. All the sugar refined at the factory came from Hawaii until 2017. Now



the sugar comes from different countries including the Philippines and Costa Rica. Another innovation at the factory

is called Cogeneration, referring to the natural gas that powers the plant and provides cheaper electricity to Crockett. We returned to Eckley Pier by the same route completing about 4 miles. Thank you, Karen and Patricia,

for such an interesting hike and for those delicious cakes.
